- 3. Reduce health care costs and hospital admissions and readmissions.




### WEST BALTIMORE CARE OVERVIEW












# Program

# SCOPE OF WORK



- 1) Compiled existing quantitative data to determine primary care capacity and major community health needs,
- 2) Conducted key informant interviews,
- 3) Conducted a community survey of residents,
- 4) Facilitated a series of stakeholder retreats to obtain community input and ensure on-going involvement of the area's leading safety net stakeholders, and
- 5) Developed a series of reports and presentations to communicate the project's findings and recommendations.
